

## Support for Parents: Online Safety

Work will be regularly updated on Purplemash.com and Mymaths.co.uk which all children have their own safe, secure access to. Any other sites suggested by Thorpedene during the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak are educational and/or have been recommended by reputable sources. All children have access to email using Purple Mash where they can email their Thorpedene friends and teachers in a secure environment: the children can report emails they are unhappy about and emails containing inappropriate language are usually detected and go straight to the site's school administrator instead of to the recipient. No one outside the Purple Mash Thorpedene community have access to this email system. Parents and carers can continue to contact the school via <u>office@thorpedene.southend.sch.uk</u>.

We must emphasise the importance of a safe online environment and encourage parents and carers to set age-appropriate parental controls on digital devices and use internet filters to block malicious websites. These are usually free, but often need to be turned on. Discussions should be had with your children to discuss the importance of online safety and what to if anything makes them feel uncomfortable. If they every wish to report harmful online content then they should visit: <u>UK Safer Internet Centre</u>.
